CONVOY PROCEDURE

1. Fuel tanks must be filled prior to start of trip.
2. Before moving off from a designated departure point the trip leader will appoint a tail-end Charlie.
3. At **All** turn-offs, vehicles shall wait until the following vehicle is aware of the former's intention. Periodical checks for the following vehicle must be made as per convoy procedure.
4. Persons leaving the club convoy **MUST** notify the trip leader and if possible, give details of their intentions.
5. No vehicle in the convoy is to pass the lead vehicle.
6. When travelling in convoy on the open road, the distance between vehicles shall not be less than 6 vehicle lengths and keep the vehicle behind in sight at reasonable intervals.
7. At nature stops the rule to be followed is ladies to the left - gents to the right.
8. In recovery procedures to avoid injury to personnel the drivers of the vehicles involved shall ensure that the immediate area is cleared.
9. All persons travelling in convoy must be inside a vehicle

CODE OF ETHICS

1. Obey restriction on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas, (i.e. DPAW, Water Authority, Fire Authorities).
2. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
3. Keep to existing tracks where possible.
4. There shall be no deliberate destruction of trees, shrubs, or wildlife.
Respect our wildlife, stop, look, and observe but never chase animals.
5. Use a well-worn campsite to minimise impact on the environment.
6. No firearms to be displayed or used in campsite or prohibited areas.
7. No unofficial competition or displays of "4WDing" shall take place during trips without permission of the trip leader.
8. At club functions members shall obey verbal instructions and visual signs erected by the organisers.
9. Drive very slowly within camp area.
10. When answering the calls of nature, members are asked to take the shovel and bury the result at all times, Ladies are respectfully requested to dispose of their paper hygienically. (i.e. rubbish container or campfire).
11. Keep the environment clean. Be prepared to carry out all the rubbish you take into unserviced areas.
12. All members are requested to **comply with the** above code

Sid's Campground trip Fri 4 to Mon 7 March 2022

It was a tight squeeze but worth it! with 18 Caravans/Rooftop tents and a group of 37 people attended Sid's Campground trip from Fri 4 to Mon 7 March 2022.

Dieter and Maureen Hurrlein organised the weekend and did not tell the group what was in store for them. Signs were posted to assist members/visitors to find the correct reserved area of Sid's campground, the yellow Wanneroo Wanderers Banner was proudly displayed on Dieter's Caravan making it easier to see from the roadside until Steve Morris decided to park his caravan in front therefore hiding the banner, Maureen requested Steve M to move the banner and display on his caravan so that it could be seen by arriving members.

Upon arrival Minties Award Winner Steve S (Burns Beach Steve), lost his Anderson Plug on his debut of his new MDC Forbes 12+ caravan, luckily visitor Brendan Waddell has one spare, so not only did this qualify BB Steve for a fine but also keeps him in the running for the Minties award for this year!

Maureen welcomed everyone and held a briefing advising the rules which if broken incurred a fine (fines were for talking during the briefing without raising your hand or speaking ill of their own or others spouse) which were easily broken causing Maureen to write down a lot of names, which caused lots of laughter, very much so that Dave Melbourne nearly choked but Keith (Kilo3) was there to offer assistance (mouth to mouth) should Dave M require it!

On **Saturday 5 March** we headed off at 9.30am in convoy and drove to Moons Crossing, *"which is a picturesque section of the Warren River, which was used by early settlers as a crossing. The rocks across the river bed were once concrete, allowing vehicles to cross, but have since been eroded and only 4WD vehicles can now use it."* While some of the group had been and crossed Moons Crossing years ago, they said it was nice to see it when there was little to no water, which gave them a different perspective.

Then we drove via a very scenic bush track to the Manjimup Heritage Park, while most members had been to Manjimup prior they had not stopped or the Heritage Park had not been completed when they were there. 2 hours of free time was assigned to the group for lunch and exploring the Heritage Park which highlights the region's working like and cultural heritage, set on 12 hectares of natural landscape and grassed picnic areas are the Stage Timber Museum, Age of Steam Museum, historical hamlet with period buildings and exhibits, and a full size replica fire lookout tower. The park also hosts the Manjimup Woodturners Association, Historical Society and Community Garden.

After lunch there was a challenge to climb and then slide down slide of the full-size replica fire lookout tower, which many took on, most in the hope of reducing their fines they had incurred during the previous night briefing! Next we drove through the Karri Forest to the Greater Beedelup National Park, The park takes its name from Beedelup Brook, which is thought to be derived from the Nyoongar word *Beedja* meaning *place of rest or place of sleep*, fitting for such a tranquil area.

The park is located on the Karri Forest Explorer Drive, an 85km scenic drive which takes in many of the areas attractions, including the Gloucester Tree, Gloucester National Park, the Cascades, the Dave Evans Bicentennial Tree, Warren National Park, the Warren River and the Big Brook Dam.

The Karri Forest is an ecosystem unique to this part of the world, growing up to 90m tall, making it one of the world's tallest hardwoods. It is home to the Gloucester Tree, Gloucester National Park, the Cascades, the Dave Evans Bicentennial Tree, Warren National Park, the Warren River and the Big Brook Dam

We drove to the Beedelup Falls section, while there wasn't much water in the Falls it was still an amazing place to visit, a boardwalk has been built around the falls, incorporating a suspension bridge at their base offering passage across the Beedelup Brook and an upstream bridge where water rushes centimetres below our feet.

We drove back via Collins and past row after row of Apple Orchards covered with netting to stop birds or passers by (Michelle!) stealing the fruit.

At the evening briefing more fines were issued. Maureen passed around menus (with no name of restaurant visible) so that members could choose if they wish to come along or not to Sunday lunch, we were happy to say that all wished to come along to the dog friendly restaurant for lunch.

On Saturday evening we met as usual for nibbles before dinner, at the briefing, Maureen had organised for Makayla and Josh (Keith (Kilo3) and Marian's grandchildren) to give a Martial Arts Demonstration as a 7am class was arranged for the group on Sunday morning, needless to say the majority of the group were not keen on getting up that early on a Sunday morning.....it was of course a joke and the relief was very visible on the groups faces when told so!

After Dinner visitors Brendan and Deanne Waddell entertained us with guitar playing and everyone joined in by requesting songs and joining in with the singing (we had the words this time!).

On **Sunday 6 March**, we departed at 10am for Manjimup, Maureen arranged with the secretary Yvonne of the Manjimup Woodturners for us to visit the Woodturners Shed, the current president Joe came out to welcome us and advised that the Woodturners were groups of Men and Women who enjoyed wood turning and met at least 3 times per week. Mt Chudalup is like 'an island in a sea of wetlands', rising abruptly from the low-lying sedge and heathlands. Around its base, a fringe of karri and marri give way to peppermint and grass trees, snottygobble, sheaok, karri hazel and banksias towards the top. From its bare rocky summit 187m above sea level, the panoramic views of both the D'Entrecasteaux and Shannon National Park were spectacular!

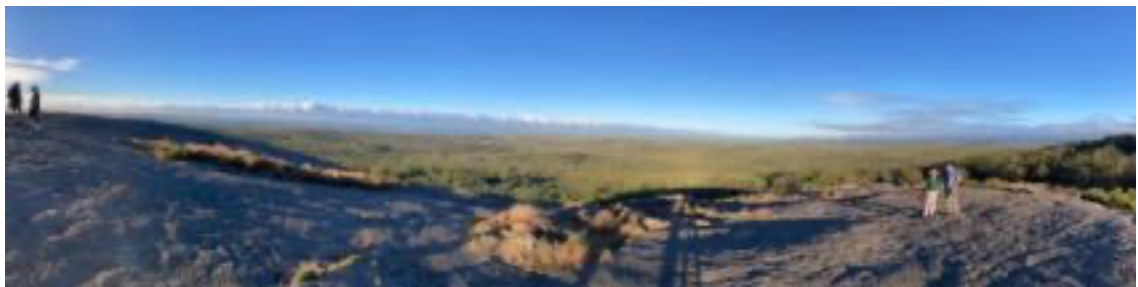

RECOVERY TRIP WILBINGA

Sunday 3rd July 2022

A total of 7 cars met in the carpark behind the Cornerstone Alehouse in Jindalee for a 9.30am departure. Attending were Judy and Phi, (trip leaders), Steve Sharp, Maureen and Dieter, Maria and Rob, Bruce, Louise and Maurice (visitors) and Dave and Pat. We arranged to meet Carl & Rachael at the Wilbinga Rd turnoff, so eight of us in all.

A quick rundown on convoy procedure for our newcomers, the obligatory chit chat, a quick outline of the days trip and off we went with a radio check on the way out of the carpark.

We followed the trip leader along Marmion Ave turned right onto Yanchep Rd then left onto Indian Ocean Drive, which Phil called Wanneroo Rd over the radio (fined at the next meeting by Maureen) then to the Wilbinga road turnoff. Deflated tyres at the information area and we were off, almost! But Steve was trying to put together his sand flag, which looked like quite a task and after 5 minutes off trying the sand flag went back in the bag. Maybe we will get to see it flying another time.

It was a beautiful day to be out, sunshine and not too windy, and we followed the track west towards the beach. The tide was very high and not a lot of the beach visible so no beach driving today. We continued north on the tracks and came across sand hills, which looked good to play around a bit. Phil up first (Judy opting to sit this one out and wait at the bottom) and after a couple of attempts and wheel spinning, a rear wheel was off the ground and Phil was going nowhere (a sure fine at the next meeting by Maureen). Carl drove around to the other side off the hill and the first recovery demonstration took place, Carl and Rachael's Ranger had no trouble pulling the Hilux over the top. No-one else in our group tackled that sand hill but while we were there another group came along and attempted it, so we all stayed and watched. First an older model Hilux made it over after numerous attempts and then a jeep with a few mods made it up and over.

We moved on to see if there was any beach access nearby, but again there was not much beach to drive on so we continued north on the tracks again.

It was getting near midday so we decided that the next decent looking spot would be our lunch stop. As luck would have it, we came across a spot that was also a good place to do some recovery demonstration.

After some lunch overlooking the ocean, we called for volunteers to get stuck. Carl put his hand up and after some effort Carl almost got bogged (well enough to get snatched out). Bruce backed up and positioned himself to pull the Ranger out. We used an equalising strap and tow rope to pull the Ranger out with Bruce's Pajero. It looked too easy so we backed the Ranger back onto the beach and Rachael and Phil dug four decent holes to get the Ranger properly "bogged" this time. On this occasion we used a snatch strap and the equaliser strap and Bruce snatched Carl out. Carl and Bruce swapped over Carl snatched the Pajero out of the sand, and just to make it a bit harder for the Ranger, Bruce left the Pajero in 2wd.

That turned out to be the last of the recoveries for the day.

We moved off again and followed the tracks north looking for more challenges with only one presenting itself. Phil and Judy leading went up and around what looked like a relatively easy track but it was quite cut up and steep at the top, the Hilux just made it and Carl and Rachael in the Ranger took a few attempts to make it over so the rest of the group took another way around. The rest of the day was a fairly easy drive just following the sand tracks through the dunes with only a couple of hairy sections that were easily navigated by all.

We did come across a side track that looked like fun, so with very little prompting Rachael gave it a go and almost made it over the top only to pop the front drivers side tyre off the rim. Carl backed it down and we had an unscripted tyre changing demonstration. The visitors we had along with us could not believe how calm we all were when things went awry.

After that we carried on with Phil keeping a lookout for the side track to Wilbinga Grove, he missed it (fined at the next meeting by Maureen AGAIN!!!) and we ended up at the northern most end of the Wilbinga 4WD area.
